HISTORY

The club started with a group of about 13 individuals who set the groundwork for the formation of the Northwest Wisconsin Gem & Mineral Society. They first met on October 1961 and began setting up bylaws and a constitution. In November 1961, they adopted the bylaws and constitution and a slate of officers was elected. The first Executive Board Members were: Clarence Sidel, President; Harold Johnston, Vice-President; Leonard Goff, Secretary Treasurer.

NATURE'S MATERIALS

When we think of **rocks** and **stones**, what comes to mind? Perhaps it is their utility: the construction of buildings, walls, roadways, bridges. Or they may be seen as a nuisance to be removed from fields before plowing. Maybe the vision of majestic mountains appears, or the memory of interesting pebbles discovered at the water's edge.

Gems are often revered as precious, to be afforded only by royalty or the wealthy. To certain gems some attribute mystical qualities and powers. Among the more commonly known gems are those assigned to each month, designated as birthstones.

Minerals and their uses have long been known, examples are metals, salts and coal. Technology has developed many important uses for these in our everyday lives.

Fossils are the remains of once living plants or animals preserved by natural means. Generally, we think of organisms that have been transformed into stone by being compressed over millions of years. Fossils also result from molds, casts and imprints. They tell us much of the history and evolution of our Earth.

Artifacts are usually shaped stone or metal objects made by early humans for functional, decorative or ceremonial use. Artifacts include spear points, arrowheads, scrapers, axes, grinding tools and ceremonial or everyday pipes. These tell us much about the development of humankind and how our ancestors used the natural materials available to meet daily needs.
