

In Memoriam Julia Donker

Julia Elaine Donker, Midwest Federation's State Director for Michigan, passed away November 13th. She was a resident of Jenison, Michigan, and the wife of current MWF President John Donker.

After growing up in the small south-central Michigan town of Colon, Julia received nurse's training across the state in Grand Rapids, where she met and married John. They raised two sons. Over the years Julia often worked as a nurse, finally with her own electrolysis business for almost 20 years.

She was also a musician, playing the organ at a local church for a number of years.

An entry in her online tribute page reads in part, "An avid gardener, she had in addition to the usual annuals, perennials, and shrubbery a special collection of moss. Imagine that! Julia gave countless hours to the Master Gardener Programs in both Ottawa and Kent

counties. Always a woman of energy and good will, she brought a positive can-do attitude to any effort she assumed."

When her boys were young, she saw that a class in lapidary would be offered in a nearby town. There she met members of the Tulip City Gem & Mineral Club, and learned that there was a club that met in Grand Rapids, the Indian Mounds Rock & Mineral Club, which was much closer to home. It seemed to her that this would be a great hobby for the whole family.

She and John have been members of Indian Mounds ever since. "She was active in the club and was a willing worker wherever she was needed," wrote Kreigh Tomaszewski, president of the club. "Her family talks fondly about the many memories they have of going to interesting places to look for rocks. Julia was all about the hunt and she loved to be in the field. She had a fondness for things that sparkled, and for fossils."

Julia and John have been very generous with their time and talents over the years, first with local clubs, then sharing the responsibilities of Michigan State Director for the Midwest Federation, traveling across the state to visit clubs on a regular basis.

She is survived by John, her husband of 55 years; her sons and daughters-in-law, John and Sharon Donker and Rand and Jean Donker; three grandchildren, a brother, and many nieces and nephews.

Annual Dues and Events Forms Are Here! And here's the Information You Need

The 2020 Midwest Federation forms for renewing club memberships are now available on our website (www.amfed.org/mwf) and in this issue of the Midwest Federation News. Look for them! Meanwhile, please alert club officers to collect information for the forms.

One important piece of information needed is the total number of individual adult and youth members during the year <u>completed</u> in 2019. These figures are used for dues and insurance calculations. The rationale is that your total membership, by the end of the year, is usually about the same, so you always pay the current-year dues based on your past experience. The treasurer needs this information **before January 15th** so that our insurance can be activated on time.

Please provide a roster of current officers, including preferred mailing addresses, phone numbers and email address. If handwritten, please ensure that letters and numbers are legible. If an individual does not want this information published on the website, follow the directions on the form to indicate this. However, please provide all contact information so we can actually reach you and not some unattended phone or email. This year you may include a list of additional officers who would like to receive the MWF News via email. You must provide the name, position and email addresses for these individuals.

We will send the MWF News to each email address that you provide. This is a great way to make sure that all of your officers are "in the know."

Clubs who renew on time will receive an email subscription to the juniors' publication Mini Miners Monthly, distributed only via email. If you wish to have the Mini Miners Monthly subscription sent to someone other than your editor (1st choice) or president (2nd choice), please provide a name, position and valid email address for that individual, and indicate that they are to receive the Mini Miners materials.

Use the EVENTS form to submit details of shows and events during the coming year. You may include a flyer, printed on white paper, as additional information. If this information is submitted with the dues, we will make sure it gets to the website, newsletter and directory coordinators. If it is submitted later, or separately, it is more likely to get overlooked.

Finally, and probably most important to many, the 2020 membership rates are the same as before. Our MWF Endowment Fund supports our special projects, helping to keep dues consistent from one year to the next. Dues are \$2.00 per adult and \$.50 per youth.

Insurance will stay the same for 2020. Our current rate is \$4.50 per individual to be covered by the policy. Clubs that submit their dues on time (postmarked no later than January 15, 2020) may take a \$.25-per-member discount. Include <u>all</u> members when computing your insurance premium.

Remember: Federation insurance policy will cover groups of clubs jointly sponsoring shows or events **only if** all of the sponsoring clubs are current federation members and all of the sponsoring clubs purchase federation insurance. Requests for insurance for these jointly sponsored events must include a list of all sponsoring clubs.

THE MONUMENT ROCKS TOWER OVER FLAT LAND IN SOLITUDE

As part of the recent trip to Western Kansas sponsored by the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute's KU chapter, our group went to see the Monument Rocks. These are gorgeous formations of Cretaceous-

era chalk – up to 70 feet high, according to Wikipedia, but they look higher when you're standing under them.

According to Rex Buchanan, our group's guide and Director Emeritus of the Kansas Geological Survey, it's a stratum of harder rock on top that kept these formations from weathering away when the rest of the chalk in the area did.

The formations are far removed from even the nearest small town and - being in western Kansas - shoot up with startling size and beauty in the midst of miles of undeveloped flat land. There are several blocks of formations, with trampled areas of grainy soil and low weeds between them, making walking from one formation to the other a little tricky but not too difficult. From one end to the other, it's maybe a quarter of a mile.

Buchanan had told us that the formations are actually on private property, and the owner allows the public to visit. They are a designated National Natural Landmark, which means that the federal government has identified them as an outstanding geological feature, but doesn't own the land.

No rock collecting is allowed here. I fear that this did not keep at least one member of the group from

slipping a small piece of the light-yellow chalk into her pocket. I will not name names.



Fossilized inoceramus clams show on the surface of the ground. Once Buchanan pointed them out, it became obvious that there are dozens of them. The specimen in the photo above was easily two feet across. That's a lotta chowder.

Weathering at the base of the formations produces an interesting poured-concrete look, as in the





left-hand photo above.

Because of the area's isolation, I was very glad that I went with a group. But the loneliness of the locale, as well as the amazing height of the formations above the flat prairie, make the splendor of the Monument Rocks all the more remarkable.
